COACH DEVELOPMENT.

Who is Andrew Basford?

For those who don't know me, I'm a coach at University of Leicester Fencing Club, and I've just completed a master's degree in "Advanced Sport Coaching Practice" at Sheffield Hallam University, which is the "UKCC Master Coach" course for Judo (but I did mine in fencing) plus an extra year to get the MSc. I'm a BF coach developer, where my main focus has been developing UFOs for the University Sabre:Lite programme.

What is this survey all about?

I believe that coaches have a thirst for learning and developing themselves as well as their fencers. If coaches are interested in developing themselves further, either by sharing good practice, with fencing specific courses, or with knowledge and experience from outside the sport, then relevant courses can be arranged centrally i.e. within the East Midlands. Potentially, we could also arrange for people to get experience from outside the sport too. Knowing what you want to achieve, will inform how you can plan your personal development.

Foiled Again:

Foiled Again Fencing Club is Derby's community fencing club and was established in 2004 to promote the sport of Fencing in Derby and the local area. In 2007, we were the first fencing club in England to be awarded Club Mark status. This was a

fantastic achievement for all involved.

The club is open to anyone over the age of 8 years Beginners' courses concentrate on Foil with Epee' and Sabre being introduced when fencers become more competent. Fencing on electric recording apparatus is also for those fencers wishing to hone their skills under competition conditions. If competitive fencing is what you want we can provide you with all the details of Regional and National competitions.

Foiled Again is fully committed to providing opportunities for juniors and adults to experience the sport of Fencing. As such we operate a very popular Outreach Programme; this has us visiting community groups across the city and the surrounding area.

Foiled Again is affiliated with British Fencing & England Fencing. Foiled Again abide by the rules and policies laid down by these governing bodies, ensuring that our club is well structured and has qualified coaches to provide instruction at all training sessions.

ARMOURERS CORNER:

Point disassembly (foil)

To clean the inside of your point you will have to completely dis-assemble it. First remove the pvc tape on the tip by carefully peeling it off or carefully cutting it away using a craft knife. You should now have exposed the grub screws on either side of the point. If you have access to a vice then it is a good idea to place the foil blade in it so that the point is held firmly at a height which is comfortable to work at. You can star to unscrew the tip starting by completely removing one screw, when you come to the second screw you should keep one finger on the top of the point to endure it does not spring out as you remove the screw. The screws should come out relatively easily and you should be careful to ensure that you don't damage the head

Point re-assembly and adjustment

Before you reassemble the point, clean out the inside of the barrel using electrical contact cleaner and a cotton bud. Do not use an oil based lubricant such as WD40 or similar, as this may trap minute particles of metal and dirt causing excessive wear, resistance and low connectivity.

Rub both ends of the foil point with an <u>abrasive block</u> before replacing. If the weapon has failed the weight test the spring should be lightly stretched or discarded and replaced. The official tests require that the spring will raise a 500g weight and that the travel is less than 1.0mm also that the blade is insulated with tape for the top 15cm.

Clean off the tip and gently abrade both ends using sandpaper or an abrasive block to improve connectivity. Ensure that the plastic sleeve is in good condition and fits the barrel. Plastic sleeves are made to different sizes by different manufacturers so check for fit before assembly.

Worn <u>grub screws</u> can cause many problems and again are not the same for different manufacturers points. Do not re-use them if they show signs of excessive wear at either end. Ensure that your point screwdriver is in good condition and of the correct size. Magnetise your screwdriver to allow you to pick up the screws more easily and ensure that you do not cross thread the grub screws when inserting them.
